#### UK ELT before the pandemic



- The UK attracted 550,000 ELT students annually
- Around half from Europe and in 2019 over half (54%) of those were juniors (students under 18 years old)
- According to VisitBritain research UK ELT students spend twice as much money in the UK and stay three times as long as other inbound visitors

#### Impact of the pandemic




- 2021 showed a 36% drop in student numbers from 2020, which was already 84% down on 2019
- Between 2019 and 2021, the sector experienced an 88% drop in student numbers and 71% decrease in student weeks

#### UK ELT today



- Life in the UK back to normal post-pandemic
- Resilience over 85% of English UK member centres have survived and are welcoming students
- UK ELT sector in recovery in 2022, 60% of 2019 prepandemic student week volume and 51% full-time student numbers
- Summer 2022 first strong rebound seen in junior segment



#### Influencing UK policy



#### Our lobbying priorities

- Introduce a group travel scheme for children
- Accreditation UK to become an Educational Oversight partner
- Expand and reform the Youth Mobility Scheme
- Restore work rights for adult students on ELT courses

#### Influencing UK policy



#### Visa reform asks

- Allow students on an 11-month short-term Study Visa to study at multiple centres
- Provide an end-to-end visa for pathway, under-graduate and postgraduate programmes
- Low-cost multiple entry Standard Visitor Visa
- Allow work experience programmes on a Standard Visitor Visa
- Allow English language students to apply for a new visa without leaving the country





## **Building sector capacity**

#### Building sector capacity



- Lobbying and working with stakeholders including Accreditation UK, assessment bodies & UK government (on youth mobility, rent a room relief, advanced learner loans, shortage occupation list)
- Increasing the visibility of career prospects and benefits in UK ELT sector through communications & promotional campaigns

# Tracking recovery

#### Tracking recovery



- Annual and quarterly student statistics reports: collecting data and insights on students who come to study English in the UK
- UK ELT sector on gradual recovery trajectory through 2022: Q1 ~55%, Q2 ~70%, Q3 ~55% & Q4 ~56% (of 2019 pre-pandemic student week volume)
- Summer 2022 first strong rebound seen in junior segment
- Top ranked source markets now largely reflect pre-Covid ones, China and Russia the notable absences
- Market structure and dynamics increasingly resemble pre-pandemic norms (eg. direct v commissionable, individual v group, and adult v junior ratios)



#### English UK membership in 2022: overview

- 329 reporting centres (-10 centres vs 2021)
- 225,641 students (+317.2% vs 2021)
- 973,716 student weeks (+108.1% vs 2021)

Source: English UK, 2022: year-on-year comparison is based on data from centres reporting in both 2021 and 2022 (n=316)



#### Juniors in 2022

- Student numbers: 49% of all students were juniors
- Student weeks: 23% proportion of student weeks spent by juniors



# Applying for a visa, avoiding refusals

#### Key visa changes post 2020



#### Visitor route allows study up to six months

- Short-term study (English language) visa is ONLY for English language courses between 6 and 11 months in length
- Student Visa for longer or non-ELT programmes
- EEA nationals need to apply for a visa if spending more than
   6 months in the UK

#### Standard Visitor Visa route



- Study is allowed for up to 6 months
- Any course(s), any accredited provider(s) but must be completed within 6 months
- No prior course booking required for visa application
- No work rights up to 30 days of volunteering allowed
- No set amount needed but must demonstrate funds are available
- Visa cost 100GBP for visa nationals
- Long-term visa holders: should not intend to study for more than 6 months per visit

#### Short term student visa (ELT)



- For students aged at least 16
- Study for 6 to 11 months
- Cannot change course/ provider study only on the course and with the provider named on the application form
- Course can be extended eg. from 7 months to visa end date (11 months)
- No work rights up to 30 days of volunteering allowed
- Visa cost 200GBP
- International health surcharge payable at point of application 470GBP
- 90 day entry visa issued and BRP to be collected after arrival

#### Applying for a visa #1



#### Caseworkers will assess whether the student genuinely intends to visit/ study in the UK by looking at:

- Age, nationality and education history
- Current level of English/ evidence of (previous) study (in home country)
- Previous immigration history, including visits to the UK and other countries: is there evidence the student has complied with immigration rules?
- Duration of previous visits especially if there were any extensions of stay
- What were the reasons given for the number and duration of the visits?

#### Applying for a visa #2



## Financial circumstances of the applicant and family members (if relevant)

- How much money is available; how were the funds acquired?
- Who is paying for the course; are there other dependants?

#### Personal and economic circumstances in the home country

- Is the student working or in education?
- Do they have a stable income/ property in their name?
- Do they have dependants?

#### Avoiding a visa refusal #1



#### **Students must:**

- Provide as much information as possible about the reasons for doing the course now and in the UK (e.g. list any previous English language study or job opportunities if relevant)
- Explain why they have chosen not to study in their home country even if it would be cheaper
- Provide financial documents which are thorough: income should match payslips;
   additional evidence for recent deposits; avoid business accounts
- Submit their own personal bank statements, even if sponsored by their employer
- Provide the course confirmation letter
- Provide study or job opportunities (if relevant)

#### Avoiding a visa refusal #2



#### How you can help:

- Read and follow the caseworker guidance
- Find out more about the student's reasons for studying
- Check the student's current level of English (you can ask the receiving school to do this)
- Ensure your partner school includes the following information on their course confirmation letter:
  - ✓ Course start and end date; not just the number of weeks of study
  - ✓ Any holiday the student intends to take during the course
  - ✓ Student's current level of English and the target level upon completion of the course
  - ✓ Total cost of the course and amount paid to date (NB: no need for fees to be paid in full)

Challenges remain, but we're on the up.
