Background

- Definitions of 'inclusion' vary...
- ...but definitions of 'exclusion' are unanimous. It's about being left out! (Kat Holmes, 2018)
- COVID-19 has accelerated the trend towards online learning...
- ...and issues of inequality and exclusion have been exacerbated.
- With ample time, resources and training, online learning can be excellent. But did everyone have these in 2020?
 What about 2021?



Let's build back fairer.

For those who routinely experience discrimination or marginalisation, inequality is not news, but for others, 2020 was a wake-up call.

Responsibility for meaningful change lies with gatekeepers: learning providers and all those who uphold unfair systems.



ILXD = Inclusive Learning Experience Design

We consider a learning experience to be inclusive if it is truly informed by learners' unique backgrounds and needs, aiming for every learner to be able to participate fully, and ready to meet new needs when they arise.



2. Three key ILXD insights



'Equality' is not 'sameness'.

X Ignoring differences

V Embracing differences

fair, inclusive treatment



removal of systemic barriers



'Design for one, extend to many'

Originally intended for Also helpful for Dropped curb: Wheelchair users People with pushchairs People with luggage

There are 4 broad factors that can affect the inclusiveness of a learning experience.

Each of these can have an influence at different levels.











INSIDE OUT

Focus on the very specific

What's built in to the learning experience itself? What do learners themselves bring to the experience?

BIG PICTURE

Bigger picture of learning

What is <u>not</u> built in to the learning experience itself but is still required for learners to participate fully?



Not limited to learning

What may seem unrelated to <u>learning</u> but will almost certainly affect the learner's experience?



	The Learner (WHY?)	Environment (WHERE?)	Materials (WHAT?)	Interactions (HOW?)
Focus on the very specific INSIDE OUT	Is the content accessible to a range of learners with different abilities?			
Big picture of learning BIG PICTURE		If a learner's physical study environment isn't ideal, how can we support them?		Have we allowed for individual learner choice or preference?
Not limited to learning OUTSIDE IN			Does the learner see their own lived experience in the learning content?	>>>

One element of Inclusive LXD is a focus on the individual and their needs.

How is this different to a standard **needs analysis** process that teachers or educators go through?



How can the learner's **physical environment** affect their experience of learning?



How can learning design be made more **representative** of diverse learners?



What issues do learners face in terms of digital access and connectivity?

- Remember to consider the whole learner.
- Empathy is a start, but action is an essential next step.
- Build in flexibility and adaptability.
- Encourage choice and direct input from learners.
- Everyone benefits from more inclusive practices.
- Look at the whole system, not just its parts.
